Executive Summary

This past year was a big one for the Alaska Fellows Program (AFP). We graduated our largest class ever in May with 26 fellows and 24 host organiations. 65% of the fellows are remaining in Alaska post-fellowship continuing to contribute to Alaska's future.

In fall 2022 AFP piloted an immersive three-day opening retreat for all four program sites at the Howard Luke "Gaalee'ya Spirit Camp" near Fairbanks on the banks of the Tanana River. While at camp, fellows got to know one another, discussed program intentions and goals for their fellowship experience and learned about Alaska. We will return again in fall 2023 to launch the next term.

Bookending the year, we had a wonderful closing convening with all four cohorts in Juneau. Fellows renewed cross site connections, spoke with Tlingit author and and retired professor, Ernestine Hayes, reflected on their experiences from the past year, hiked, made homemade pasta, created amazing art, arm wrestled, and played some of the most intense foosball games I have ever seen. Fellows even hosted a "Friends of AFP" art show in downtown Juneau to showcase their creative skills.

I can't wait to meet the next cohort!


WE ARE AFP

TThe Alaska Fellows Program (AFP) is a fall-to-spring residential fellowship program that nurtures the next generation of Alaska-based leaders by pairing talented young people with strong communities and professional mentors.

Initially launched with a small pool of Yale graduates in 2014, the program now boasts alumni from 35 states and seven countries, and hosts fellows in Anchorage, Juneau, Sitka and Fairbanks. Forty-six percent of alumni continue to live and work in Alaska for a year or more after their fellowships.

AFP both helps Alaska retain homegrown talent by connecting born-andraised Alaskans with social-impact opportunities in their home state and by attracting young, early-career professionals to the state.

Fellows serve with a dynamic non-profit or public-sector organization for the fellowship term and receive modest living stipends and housing. Fellows live communally, work closely with professional mentors,

Upcoming

AFP will grow in 2023/24. Increased host interest in Anchorage allowed us to expand from seven fellows to 11 and add an additional house to the program! We plan to add a car to our fleet in Anchorage to support the additional fellows. These changes allow us to serve four more wonderful nonprofits in Anchorage.

In Sitka, the program has been renting a well-suited house for many years. The owners are interested in selling and AFP is exploring options to purchase the property. This would provide future security for AFP in an incredibly tight housing market. There are many details to work out, but the owner continues to be a great supporter of the program and is committed to working with us to make this a reality.

AFP continues to be fiscally sponsored by Outer Coast while making progress towards gaining our own 501(c)(3) status. We have solidified our board governance including crafting bylaws and adding new legal capacity onto the AFP board. We aim to be a stand-alone nonprofit by FY25.
